- AsiaGlobal Paper Authors ought to follow the Author-Date system in the Chicago Style guide.
- In the Author-Date system, sources are briefly cited within the text using parentheses including the author’s last name and year of publication. Each in-text citation matches with an entry in the reference list at the end of the paper where full bibliographic information is provided. Footnotes are not required.

Journal article

- In-text citation
